As additional information becomes available, it will be posted to www.isba.us within the News and Events section. β


Keynote Speaker for Fall Meeting Announced

Queen breeders' Meeting

On September 26 there will be a meeting sponsored by the Illinois Queen Initiative (IQI, formerly known as the Illinois Queen Project) at the Farm Bureau in Bloomington, Illinois. The IQI goals include greatly increasing production of Illinois queens and nucs for sale so that Illinois beekeepers can have productive, disease resistant colonies that over-winter well in our climate. The



purposes of the meeting include the following:

1. To trouble shoot queen raising efforts by those who took one of the two queen rearing classes taught by Dr. Joe Lattshaw in April at either David Burns□ apiary or at the Byron Forest Preserve. We will discuss successes and challenges and share helpful information, including the Cloake Board method of cell starting and finishing and other variations on producing queens. We will also have a demonstration of testing for hygienic behavior, which is relatively simple and should be used by all those who wish to produce quality queens.

2. To identify those beekeeping associations that might be interested in sponsoring queen rearing workshops like those offered last year.

This meeting is intended for two groups of persons:

1. Those 32 persons who took one of the two queen rearing classes last April.

2. Representatives of beekeeping associations that might be interested in sponsoring queen rearing workshops. (The workshops are intended primarily for those who plan to raise queens for sale to other beekeepers in addition to their own needs.) At this stage we are not looking for a solid commitment but wish to gauge the level of interest in sponsorship. During the meeting we will explain what will be needed in order to sponsor a successful queen rearing course. Eventual decisions will be made on geographical considerations and on which associations evidence capability to sponsor a workshop.

If you believe that your association has the interest and resources, including a location for a small (even temporary) apiary adjacent to a classroom setting in which cell grafting could be carried out, we are inviting your organization to send 1-3 representatives who could share information with the association members and leaders. Due to time limitations, this meeting will not be teaching the basics of queen rearing per se. These will be covered in next year's queen rearing classes. β

Those Cute Little Beetles

I had my first encounter with the small hive beetle in the spring of 2008. They seemed to be harmless enough. There were a few dozen of them below and on top of the inner cover. They were still there in the spring of 2009—yet I found no apparent damage to the comb. But... I have heard the horror stories.

Just to check my identification, I sent a sample to the USDA lab in Beltsville, MD. They agreed. I had found small hive beetles.

I recalled a visit from Dr. Jamie Ellis at one of our Springfield meetings. He was involved in research involving the use of nematodes to control small hive beetles. A quick email got me the nematode's name—Steinernema RioBrave—and a source, Southeastern Insectaries in Perry, GA. Following the directions from Southeastern Insectaries I applied six million microscopic nematodes to the soil around the hives.

Now this is far from scientific evidence, but when the hives were inspected during the last week of August, there was not a small hive beetle to be found. Is it a cure for small hive beetle infestation? I doubt it. But this beekeeper is happy. β
